

ABOUT HYDRA

Hydra is a small, cosmopolitan Greek island situated between Poros and Spetses. It's 37 nautical miles from the port of Piraeus (Athens) and is near the coast of the eastern Peloponnese.

The port and town of Hydra - where you will arrive at by ferry or Flying Dolphin - is built on the hills surrounding its horseshoe harbour. On tiers rising steeply up from the waterfront, you'll see white-walled houses with red tile roofs and large grey stone mansions.



Hydra's streets are narrow, stone-paved and vehicle free – not even any bicycles. Donkeys and water taxis are the principal modes of transport.

TRAVEL TO HYDRA

Athens Airport

The new Athens Airport "Eleftherios Venizelos" is situated approximately 1.5 hours from the port of Piraeus, where you catch the Hydrofoil to Hydra. Please take this into consideration when arranging your flights, and don't forget to allow time to clear immigration, find your bags and find your Hydrofoil.

Bring Euro coins with you if you want to use a trolley - there's no change machine before customs. There are cash machines in the Arrivals Hall if you want to get Euros.

Travel options to Piraeus

X96 Express Bus

To catch this bus to Piraeus, you need to leave through exit door 5 (right out of customs, the last one at the end of the arrival hall). You need to purchase a ticket from the booth before boarding the bus. Tickets cost 3.20 Euros per person. The E96 bus and the bus stop are clearly marked in English and Greek with the destination (Piraeus). There's plenty of space for luggage and they go at least 3 times an hour, 23 hours a day. When you board please make sure you validate your ticket in the red box on the post behind the driver's seat. There are on the spot fines if an inspector finds un-validated tickets! The journey time is approximately 1.5 hours.

Metro

You can also travel by Metro to Piraeus. This takes 60 minutes, but involves a slightly longer walk at either end, and one change.

Take Metro line 3 to Monastiraki, and change there, taking Line 1 to Piraeus. You need to buy one ticket for the entire journey, fares are as follows:

Single fare €6

Single fare for 2 persons (flat ticket) €10

Single fare for 3 persons (flat ticket) €10

Teens (under 18 years), Students €3

Taxis

The taxi rank is outside exit door 3 but the queue during high season starts outside exit door 2. There are lots of taxis so the queue goes down really quickly. Yellow taxi prices vary depending upon the time of day, the number of passengers and the season, but based on 2004 prices you should budget for at least 40 euros. This is a slightly quicker option than the bus.

Piraeus to Hydra - Your options

The port of Piraeus is large and sprawling. If you take a taxi from the airport, ask for Piraeus and make sure the driver knows you're heading for Hydra and then you'll get put down at the right part of the port. The bus terminal is right outside the port gates so you just need to walk in.

The quick options

Hellas Shipping operates their **Flying Dolphins and Cats** (hydrofoils) - <http://www.dolphins.gr/> out of Piraeus and has a regular timetable throughout the year. You'll find their ticket offices around the port.

EUROSEAS sail to/from Hydra twice daily

September timetables should be available at the end of July.

The slow boat

Along the harbour wall you'll also find ticket booths for the Saronikos Ferry which takes about 3-3.5 hours and stops along the way at Poros. You can't book tickets in advance. The ferry is by far the cheapest option but the draw back is that it only goes once a day at 08:00 in the morning. In very high season another one goes about 14:00. In the winter there tends to only be one sailing at 8am and only at weekends. Saronikos also operate a few flying dolphins out of Piraeus but again they tend not to go regularly in the winter.

SUMMER SCHOOL VENUE

The Summer School will be held at the Bratsera Hotel, 5 minutes walk from the port. To get there from the port, follow the corner lane, down the left-hand side of the Alpha Bank. At the Amalour bar, take the right fork. You will come across the Bratsera hotel on the left hand side.

Very close to the Hotel Greco (see above). Small, quiet, family-run pension.

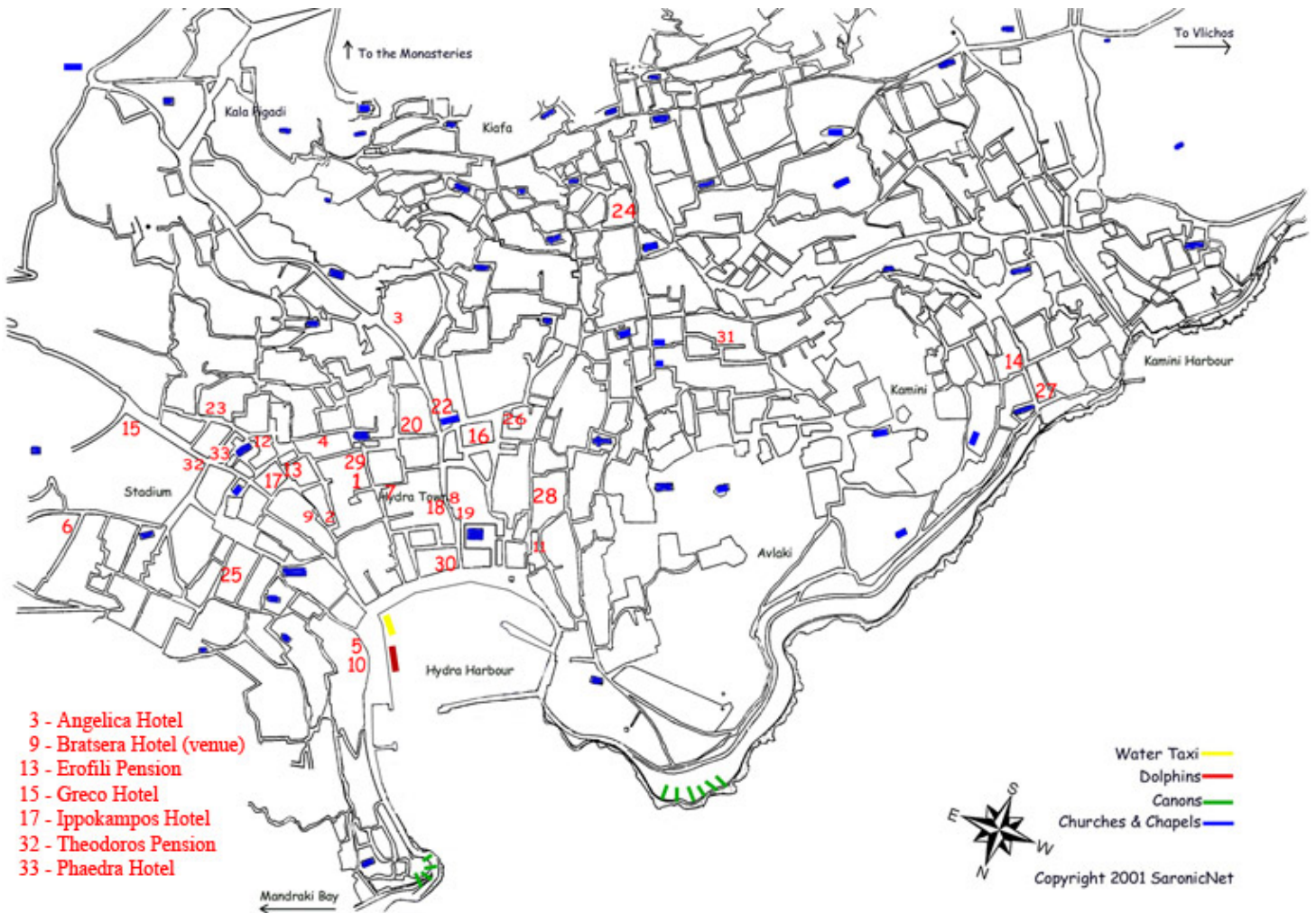

You are free to make your own arrangements for meals not listed in the programme. For good inexpensive food search the back-streets or walk down the coast. There are nice seafood restaurants in the village of Kaminia, and we recommend the Pirofani Restaurant behind Kaminia (ask at reception for directions, 20 minute walk).

There are also plenty of cafés and bars...the Ydronetta built into the 'canons' on the west side of the port is a great spot for drinks and even night swimming!

ACTIVITIES

Swimming

Beaches aren't sandy, but there are plenty of nice places to swim.

- Closest to town, there are swimming spots on the west side of the port.
- 1.5 km to the east is Mandraki, accessible on foot or by a short boat-ride
- Further afield, you can take an organised trip or water taxi to the southwestern extreme of the island, and the bays of Bisti and Ayios Nikolaos.
